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## Development of a Guidebook for preventing Hepatitis B

Was developed and produced in 2007 by the Hepatitis B Initiative of Washington, D.C. (HBI-DC) in partnership with the Association of Asian Pacific Community Health Organizations (AAPCHO) and the Asian Pacific Islander American Health Forum (APIAHF) funded thru the Office of Minority Health.

- Provide leaders and outreach workers with talking points related to Hepatitis B Virus.








# Comparison between Countries






## Hepatitis B Screenings
