Mission

Hep B United is a national coalition dedicated to reducing the health disparities associated with hepatitis B by increasing awareness, screening, vaccination, and linkage to care for high-risk communities across the United States.

Goals

- **Awareness:** Raise the profile of hepatitis B and liver cancer as an urgent public health priority.
- **Prevention:** Increase hepatitis B testing and vaccination, particularly among Asian Americans, Pacific Islanders and other high-risk communities.
- **Intervention:** Improve access to care and treatment for individuals living with hepatitis B to prevent end-stage liver disease and liver cancer.

Strategic Priorities or Core Values

Hep B United works to reduce the impact of hepatitis B through prevention and education efforts, addressing perinatal transmission, improving screening and linkage to care, contributing to national surveillance data, and advocating on a national level.

1. **Prevention and Education:** Reduce/eliminate new cases of hepatitis B by increasing awareness, effective prevention, and risk reduction strategies. Promote and provide information to at-risk persons, patients, health care workers, and the general public to increase testing, increase timely and appropriate vaccinations, and improve linkage to care to prevent hepatitis B and related liver disease including liver cancer.
2. **Perinatal Hepatitis B Transmission:** Eliminate perinatal hepatitis B transmission through expanding partnerships with state and local level perinatal hepatitis B prevention coordinators, increasing education and awareness among health care providers and HBV-infected women, promoting the universal birth dose, and providing appropriate case management for infected pregnant women.
3. **Linkage to Care:** Develop community- and clinic-based infrastructure to improve patient navigation to increase the capacity of community coalitions to identify, counsel, vaccinate susceptible individuals, and care for individuals living with hepatitis B to limit the progression of liver damage and liver cancer.
4. **Liver Cancer Prevention and Early Detection:** Reduce the incidence of hepatitis B-related liver complications including hepatocellular carcinoma (HCC), cirrhosis, and liver failure through screening, early detection, and treatment.
5. **Surveillance:** Promote, advocate for, and contribute to national hepatitis B data, to monitor disease trends, assess the burden of hepatitis B and liver cancer in highly impacted communities, and evaluate programmatic impact.
6. **Advocacy:** Raise the profile of hepatitis B and liver cancer as urgent public health priorities.
