

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Hep B United Partners in 27 states, DC and 40 cities



Blood



Household contact



Direct blood to blood contact with an infected person

Sharing hygiene equipment (razors, toothbrushes, earrings) Mother to child transmission



Blood exchange during birth (perinatal transmission)

Perinatal Transmission



Perinatal transmission is the most common way that people get infected. This can be prevented through a safe and effective vaccine. All pregnant people should be tested for hepatitis B, and those infected might need treatment during pregnancy. All babies born in the world should begin the hepatitis B vaccine starting at birth. This "birth dose" is necessary for all babies born to infected moms.

Someone also can get hepatitis B through:

Unsterile healthcare

exposures

Intimate contact







Sharing needles



Tattoos, piercings, barbers, scarification, circumcision practices





"Hepatitis B is a viral infection caused by the hepatitis B virus. If left undiagnosed, it can lead to liver damage or liver cancer over time.

It is very important to keep the liver healthy because it has many roles in the body.

It helps digest food, regulates energy, breaks down toxins, fights infections, processes medications, stores vitamins, and helps your blood clot!

Your guide to Locating Hepatitis B Testing Resources

Testing to know your status is important! By being aware of resources available to help community members locate testing, you can help save lives. There are several ways to locate a place to get tested.

Locating a doctor:

People can get tested for hepatitis B through their primary care provider. Ask the community member if they have a doctor that they feel comfortable asking for testing through. Finding Lower Cost Testing Services:



People can also get tested for a lower cost at Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs). They are usually able to see patients for a low cost, or even for free. Please visit to locate an FQHC near the community member. It may also be helpful to call and better understand the services they provide..

Your guide to
Using the Hepatitis B Flipchart for Community Education

Overview:

This tabletop flipchart is intended for use between an educator (you) and a community member. Each page is double-sided, and with a script for you on one side, and a picture-based description of the information for community member on the other. The information presented is intended to provide a simplified overview of hepatitis B and its relevance to the African immigrant community. Be sure to read through the script before presenting.

Before you begin

Explain that you will be discussing hepatitis B today. The information should take about 10–15 minutes to go through. If the community member has any questions at any time, let them know that they may ask. Your script contains additional tips and information that may help address common questions. If at any point you are unsure of a question, let them know that you will follow-up. Your toolkit contains additional fact sheets on hepatitis B and you may also contact the Hepatitis B Foundation at info@hepb.org

After the presentation

If the community member seems comfortable, begin an open conversation by asking some of the discussion questions. Be patient and sensitive of a community member's values. Let them know that you can be a resource to them going forward. Be sure to hand them the information card that summarizes the information presented and provides resources for finding local testing.



BEST PRACTICES

- Obtain the community members input on the educational materials prior to use.
- Distribute materials before a scheduled HBV screening/vaccination events. Ensure that your team has received training on the toolkit.
- During workshops and other events, ACANA Health navigators explain the information in languages and dialects familiar with the community (French, Mandingo, Tri, Fulani etc.)
- Include HBV screening at preventive health and Cancer screening community events. (Health fairs)
- Establish a clear path for obtaining HBV screening results and referral for treatment and follow-up.
- Regular Educational workshops must be promoted to increase awareness.
