Liver Health Connection's mission is to promote liver health, provide education, & to support & advocate on behalf of those affected by liver diseases.

We serve Colorado through our programs and the nation through our HelpLine.

In 2017, we:

- provided antibody testing to 2,980 people
- educated 1,683 attendees at 105 presentations
- > answered 1,143 HelpLine & Help4Hep calls
- provided 826 services to 216 active patient navigation clients



Public Policy

- Senate Joint Resolutions at the Colorado Legislature for multiple years – developed awareness, identified legislative supporters – tested at the Capitol
- Passed hepatitis C testing bill for baby boomers in 2014; increased testing within private pay systems
- Denver City Councilman has sponsored awareness activities and resolution for many years – personal connection to HCV



Viral Hepatitis Task Force

- Organized for State Health Department
- 30+ participating organizations that provide services to people with risk factors
- Agenda includes medical updates, testing goals, syringe exchange results, trouble shooting issues like lack of PCP medical homes
- Will be incorporating Colorado Cancer Plan goals for HBV vaccination of adults and reduction of peri-natal transmission, HCV testing among baby boomers



National Hepatitis Testing Day

- LHC coordinates a centralized testing event for Denver, usually held in a City building
- In 2018 NHTD will be held outside in Confluence Park, which is frequented by persons who are experiencing homelessness and/or use substances

Approximately 3.4 million people in the U.S. are infected with chronic hepatitis C virus (HCV). Of these, 50% are undiagnosed and most were born in the baby boomer age cohort, from 1945 to

Colorado nonprofit organizations are offering free HCV antibody testing to help identify people with the virus and to increase awareness. Left undiagnosed or untreated, HCV can lead to cirrhosis, liver cancer, or death. Nearly 20,000 deaths in the U.S. were associated with HCV in

Anyone can be tested for HCV, but Liver Health Connection and the CDPHF especially recommend Anyone can be tested for IrV., Out Liver Haller Conflection and the CUPPLE septically recommend testing for those born between 1454 and 1956. Also a risk are those who hald a blood transfusion or a blood product like Rhogam before 1992, obtained a tettoo outside of a licensed facility, or injectiod or snorted drugs —even once. In addition, the Center for Disease Control and Prevention says men who have had sex with other men should be tested.

Proclamation 17-0545
Recognizing May 19th as "Hepatitis Testing Day" and July 28th as "World Hepatitis Day"

WHEREAS, May 19th is National Hepatitis Testing Day and July 28th is World Hepatitis Day; Hepatitis C is recomized as the most common blood-borne viral infection in the United States; and

WHEREAS, Hepatitis C has infected an estimated 70,000 Coloradans, as many as 3.5 million American residents (nearly 1 in 50 persons), and more than 130 million people worldwide; and is the leading cause of cirrhoss, liver cancer, and liver transplants in the United States; and

WHEREAS, people born between 1945 and 1865 are 5 times more likely to be infected than other adults; more than 75 percent of all people with Hepatits C in the United States are people in this age range and are largely unware of the condition due to fack any signs, symptoms and testing; leading Hepatitis C to be labeled as "the sitent epidemic" and

WHEREAS, Hepatitis C can be prevented; testing can identify existing infections; and early diagnosis and treatment can save lives, money, and resources; and

WHEREAS, Liver Health Connection is available as a statewide resource for education, testing, linkage to care, patient navigation, helpline and other support services.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT PROCLAIMED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF

Section 1. The Deriver City Council agrees that preventing and treating Hepatitis C is an important public health initiative that will improve the quality of life for Deriver residents affected by the virus.

Section 2. The Deriver City Council proclaims May 19th as Hepatitis Testing Day and recognizes July 28th

Section 3. That the Clerk of the City and County of Deriver shall attest and affix the seal of the City and County of Deriver to this proclamation and that a copy be transmitted to Nancy Steinfurth, Executive Director of i
